

C. I. WILLIAMS RITES THURSDAY

One of City's Most Successful Architects Dies of Paralysis.

An illness of more than six months was terminated at 8:45 o'clock Tuesday night in the death of Charles Insko Williams in his late home, 1042 Grand av. Death was caused by paralysis.

Funeral services will be conducted at the Grand av. address, Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock and burial will be in Woodland cemetery.

Mr. Williams was 69 years of age, and was a conspicuous figure in Dayton history, having been recognized before his retirement several years ago as one of the city's most successful architects.

He was the architect of Stivers High school on E. Fifth st., the Gibbons Hotel, Heibold building, Sacred Heart church, Harbour apartment house, Bellevue apartment house, State theater building, Trinity Reformed church, Dayton City club and the Callahan bank building. Two school houses in Riverdale, a school building and the Methodist church in North Dayton, also were planned by him.

The decedent was born in Cincinnati in 1853. At the age of 16 years he came to Dayton with his parents. In 1870 he was graduated from the Chickering Institute of Cincinnati and later entered technical training in the Troy Polytechnic Institute in New York. In 1873 he was engaged in civil engineering for the Northern Pacific railroad and later returned to Dayton and opened an artist's studio.

In 1880 he became affiliated with the John Rouzer Co., lumber dealers and two years later opened an architect's office. Mr. Williams was married in 1879 to Miss Susan Dorothy Boyer, daughter of D. K. Boyer.

Besides his wife, Mr. Williams is survived by four sons, Howard Insko, Louis Boyer, Dick K. and Roger William. He was a member of the Masons, Shriners, Dayton City club and the Christ Episcopal church.
